THIS WEEK'S LESSON: BETTER THAN SHAKESPEARE

IN THE CAR:

Ask your child what they learned about this week on the drive home: God's books of poetry are not simply pretty verses. They are filled with praise to our God and wisdom for daily living. Proverbs 1:1-7, Listen to Wisdom

TANGING OUT:

Make this week's lesson real:

Ask the kids to teach you the hand motions they learned to help them remember the poetry books of the Bible. See if they can remember all of the books from the beginning.

AT DINNER:

Here are some great discussion starters:

- What are the five books of poetry?
- What do we find in the book of Psalms?
- What else do we find in the books of poetry that can help us every day?

AT BEDTIME:

Quiz your child on this week's memory verse:

What you need to know:

The books of poetry are full of praise songs and wisdom for daily life. Read some Psalms and Proverbs with your kids this week, and ask them if they can tell what the author is trying to teach through their poetry.
